

Pastoral Scene

70 x 7 is not just a math problem

The Gospels often focus on the forgiveness of others. In the Gospel of Matthew that was read last Tuesday, Peter asked Jesus how often we were to forgive our neighbor, and was seven times a sufficient measure. Jesus answered Peter by saying that our standard for offering forgiveness was 'seventy times seven', or pretty much endless. I have a great love for this gospel, not because I can forgive well, but for what I learned from it over the years.

Some time ago an individual, with whom I had a wonderfully warm relationship, suddenly turned into Frosty the Snowperson. Since I had no idea why the coldness, I waited a couple of weeks before I tried to rekindle the relationship. Try as I might, no action on my part was successful. As I have often been told, I am not the brightest bulb in the marquee, so I did some prayerful soul-searching, tried a few more strategies, prayed about it, and finally took this problem to a good friend who was also my confessor. Somehow I hoped he could shed some light on this challenging problem when I made my confession. He did, but not in the way I expected.

When it came time for receiving my penance, the confessor said, "I want you to try one more time to heal this friendship even if you do not know what you did." Not noted for tact, I blurted out, "Oh, come on! Can't you just give me a rosary?" There was that priestly pause and then he stated, "Well, it all depends if you want absolution . . ." For a nanosecond I thought about the alternative, but knew when the priest takes the place of Jesus, one certainly must obey!

About a week later, my former friend and I attended a sparsely populated early morning Mass, and I heard the Lord's voice saying, "if your brother has anything against you, go and be reconciled with your brother before you bring your gift to the altar." At the sign of peace, I walked over, extended my hand hoping this would be the magic moment, but was rebuffed. Not a happy ending to be sure, but for the first time I truly felt at peace. Now you may wonder why I would want to share this story?

The Gospels always make the link between God's forgiveness of us and our forgiveness of one another. This situation – and my unexpected penance – have helped me to develop a strategy to become a better forgiver and have made me much more aware of what I say, think, and do.

As an imperfect human being, I try to keep my sins and imperfections before my mind's eye, especially when I pray the Our Father and the penitential rite at the beginning of Mass.

As our priests here at the parish advise, I try to get to confession more often. I find that when my sins have to be verbally spoken, I can be a lot more realistic about what I experience and far more careful of what I do.

I try to forgive quickly and remain tolerant of those who are carrying much heavier crosses than I must shoulder.

I have also found that forgiveness needs to be concrete. The, 'he or she will understand' does not do it. Writing a note, making a call, speaking to one personally is very much what Jesus would do if He were in our place.

Seventy times seven is not just a math problem! It is also a wonderful reminder of the infinite forgiveness of a merciful and loving God who hopes that we will reflect that tender mercy to those around us.
